THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

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The situation in South-Ossetia, resolution adopted by the General Assembly, on its 2nd meeting, held on 31 March 2009

The General Assembly,

Deeply concerned about the actions that have been taken from the involved parts of this situation,

Further concerned about the lack of communication between the involved parts in this issue,

Fully alarmed by the humanitarian situation in South-Ossetia after the conflict in August 2008,

Deeply convinced that this issue must be solved for a common peaceful future in order to prevent a larger war between not only the involved states and republics but also other states with influence,

Bearing in mind that the conflict between South-Ossetia and Georgia has been going on since 1992,

Noting with deep concern that the relation between the United States of America and the Russian Federation has been strained a lot due to the Russian Federation's decision to recognize South-Ossetia as an independent state,

Having studied the similarities between this situation and the so called situation that China has had with Tibet in order to:

- (a) Understand the Russian Federation's decision to interfere with Georgian politics,
- (b) Be able to give the Russian Federation the information they might need about situations like this,

Further noting with concern that the living standards in South-Ossetia is terrible partly due to:

- (a) Drug-smuggling,
- (b) Weapon-contrabands,
- (c) Influential criminal organisations,

Further believing that outlaw states such as South-Ossetia and Abkhazia are in need of help from a firm hand in order to become wealthier republics,



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1. *Expresses its hope* for a long lasting ceasefire and eventually a solution between the different states;
2. *Deplores* all states taking advantage of the situation in the area in order to gain more influence in the eastern countries;
3. *Calls upon* a dialogue among the Russian Federation, Georgia, South-Ossetia and Abkhazia in order to minimize the risk of misunderstandings which can prevent the current solution;
4. *Emphasizes* that no other states or republics, but the ones who are involved by the moment, should interfere in the current situation;
5. *Trusts* that the involved parts do what they can in order to stabilize the situation in Georgia and South-Ossetia;
6. *Requests* urgently an agreement which secures the human rights in South-Ossetia;
7. *Demands* a broad solution in order to control the illegal trade of weapons and drugs to prevent further conflicts;
8. *Strongly deplors* the engagements that have been made on both of the sides in this situation;
9. *Encourages* all the leaders in concerned parts to do what they can to establish a long lasting peace in the South-Ossetian area;
10. *Draws attention* to the consequences that the recognition of South-Ossetia may have in the future.
